From the Senior Warden

Social media exposes us to so much information each day. On Facebook, many share quotes or thoughts which have meaning to them...and they are often "reshared" so many times that it isn't possible to know their source. Such is the case with the following which I recently saw: "I believe churches are meant for praising God. But so are 2AM car rides, showers, coffee shops, the gym, conversations with friends, strangers, etc. Don't let a building confirm your faith because we will never change the world by just going to church... we need to be the church."

At Grace, we offer our praise to God in many ways. We serve breakfast, do laundry, collect clothes, and provide food to those in need. The

Rector's Discretionary Fund assists those in crisis with rent assistance or help paying for utilities, and sometimes much more. In my time serving as Senior Warden over these past four years I have been able to witness many such circumstances where individuals have stepped up and gone above and beyond to help someone in need. And I've seen many step forward to join in the work we do in the community.

I was recently inspired when I suggested that we create a team that would provide meals (we do well with food!) to our own parishioners in time of need. I sent an email to several of my mailing lists and in less than 12 hours, 14 parishioners had volunteered to help with this ministry. By the next day, there were over 20. I was overwhelmed - so many who responded to a simple "ask."

The Living Compass program is a tool to help us get to know each other, to learn about each other and to take care of each other. We work hard to help those outside of Grace, we need to grow our ministry to support each other. As we learn what calls to each of us, we can join together to weave the fabric of Grace, supporting each other in the ways we wish to offer our praise to God. I hope that over the next year we continue to grow in this way because we are the church.

Of course, it is still important to gather together to worship and to maintain our building for the many ministries it houses. But we need to remember that we live out the kingdom of God on earth in many different places every day.

I especially hope you'll join us at worship services the weekend of January 12th & 13th as we welcome Rev. Chris and his family home from

sabbatical. It will be wonderful to have them back with us.

Chris will start "easing back" into his responsibilities on January 7th. There will be much for him to catch up on, let's give him the opportunity to do without overwhelming him.

If you sent him an email while he was away, don't anticipate that he read it. The diocese strongly recommends that a priest on sabbatical not read emails while away and I hope that is what Chris has done.

Finally, I want to express our deep gratitude to Rev. Ran Chase who has been with us throughout this sabbatical time. He has led us in worship and assisted with pastoral needs. But his presence has been felt in so many more ways and we are grateful for all he has given us during this time.

Liturgy & Liturgical Ministry

Season of Epiphany

The season of Christmas, the shortest liturgical season of the year, ends on its twelfth day on January 5th. We then take up our liturgical

story on January 6th with the **Feast of the Epiphany**. This year Epiphany falls on a Sunday. A tradition at Grace, the origin of which remains somewhat of a mystery, is a special service called **The Epiphany Festival of Lights**. As constituted it is a combination of Evensong and pageant, which took place in the afternoon of the Sunday nearest the Epiphany. This service is based on the idea that Jesus' light is meant for all the peoples of the earth. The readings unfold the story of the birth of Jesus, and the dissemination of His

Word by the apostles to the Gentiles, as represented by Matthew's story of the three Magi, and his story of the Calling of the Apostles. We end the service by literally taking the Light of Christ out into the world by bearing candles as we recess out of the church through the front door. The service requires thirty to thirty-five lay ministers. It meant that in addition to serving at the Eucharist in the morning, everyone had to return in the afternoon again. Last year the service had to be canceled due to inclement weather. This year it has been decided to try something different. Instead of a separate service, we are having an **Epiphany Festival of Lights & Holy Eucharist** at the 10AM service on that Sunday, which is actually the Epiphany. All the traditional hymns, readings and pageantry have been retained, and the Eucharist has been added where it would logically happen in the sequence of the rite.

Who were the **Magi**? Later in some traditions they are referred to as Kings. It is one of my favorite stories, these three men following a star to

find where its light leads. Most sources believe that they were Zoroastrian, a religion whose roots are Persian, and whose scriptures predict this happening. Rather than kings, they were most probably priests of sorts, or sorcerers. The Latin word that is used to identify them, *Magi*, literally means sorcerers, men of magic. The word etymologically has to do with "magic" rather than royalty, in which case the word *Magni* would be more appropriate. The similarity in these two words is probably responsible for this misunderstanding. The other curious tradition, which dates from the earliest pictorial renditions of these three, is that one of the three was Black. Somewhere along the line they acquired the names Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. Their three gifts represent Christ's royal status (gold), His status as God made man (incense), and his death and resurrection (myrrh). They are the first gentiles to worship Him, and an example that all people on earth were included in His saving grace.

January 13th is the **First Sunday after Epiphany**, which is also the **Feast of the Baptism of Jesus**. On this Sunday we will be welcoming back our Rector, Chris, and saying farewell and thanks to Ran, who has led us admirably through the months of Chris' sabbatical. This is one of the four Sundays during the year when baptisms usually take place. If there is no baptism in the offing, then the service includes the Baptismal Covenant. For the season of Epiphany we will be using the Prayers of the People based on the lectionary and Eucharistic Prayer C.

The season of Epiphany can be anywhere from four to nine weeks long, dependent on when Easter falls. This year it is eight weeks long. After the First Sunday, it becomes “ordinary time” and the color changes from white to green. January 19th-20th is the **Second after Epiphany** on which we will be celebrating **Children’s Liturgy** at the 10AM service. The **Third after Epiphany**, January 26th-27th, traditionally is **Outreach Sunday** when we recognize our Outreach services and the dedicated volunteers that make them happen..

February begins with **Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple** on Saturday, February 2nd and the **Fourth after Epiphany**, on Sunday, February 3rd. It is one of those odd times when a special Feast Day falls on a Saturday so that the readings are for the feast day rather than the usual ones for Sunday. The following Sundays proceed in order, the **Fifth through the Last Sunday after Epiphany** which is the weekend of March 2nd-3rd. The season of Epiphany ends with **Mardi Gras**, Fat or Shrove Tuesday, March 5th. Regular weekend Eucharist Services will take place those weekends. Sunday, February 17th, there will be **Children’s Eucharist** at the 10AM service.

Wednesdays in January and February

At the Wednesday 10AM service we will be celebrating **The Holy Name of Jesus**, January 2nd; **Julia Chester Emery**, January 9th; **The Confession of St. Peter**, January 16th; **The Conversion of St. Paul**, January 23rd; **Thomas Aquinas**, January 30th; **Cornelius the Centurion**, February 6th; **Absalom Joines**, February 13th; **Martin Luther**, February 20th; and **St. Matthias**, February 27th.

Note: During the winter months Wednesday services are automatically cancelled if New Bedford Public Schools are closed.

Days of Awe and Wonder

Through the fall, a few of us have been meeting for lunch in the Youth Room to discuss this collection of

essays by the late Marcus Borg, renowned New Testament scholar and theologian. Many of the essays seem to date to about 2007, and several were given as sermons or keynote addresses; one was an interview!

The book is subtitled “How to be a Christian in the twenty-first century,” which might lead you to think the essays would be full of do’s and don’ts. In fact, the emphasis is more on how to be. Borg reiterates the same two points again and again, whether describing them in the life of Jesus as passed down to us in the New Testament, or in his own internal experience and that of others.

The first point is about mysticism and this explains the emphasis on our present century. As Borg writes, for most of human history, and in most cultures, the vivid experience of a second, inner world is assumed as true. Certainly, this was true in Biblical times. In the fourth essay, “Jesus, our model for being spiritfilled,” he cites each instance in the Gospels where Jesus is described as having visions. It is only in the last few centuries, in our culture, that such experiences are commonly assumed to be mistaken or untrue. Even in theological circles, mystical experiences are seldom spoken of. Borg encourages us to acknowledge the reality of mystical experience in our own lives.

The second point is about the centrality of compassion and social justice in Jesus’ message to his followers, then and now, as the path

to be followed. In "The heart and soul of Christianity," Borg's portion of a lecture he gave with Huston Smith at the First Congregational Church in Berkeley in 2006, he wrote:

"The kingdom of God is what life would be like on earth if God were king and the rulers of this world were not. Or, to use the most famous verse in the New Testament to make that point, "For God so loved the world." It doesn't say "... me," or "... us," or "...the church," ... or "...Christians," but "...the world," which I hear as not only including human beings, but the non-human world as well."

Advent Quiet Day

On the first of December, a few of us met with John of the Trinity for a reflection on the Book of the Revelation to St. John. The thing to be discovered in this revelation, we were told, is God's plan for the world. It was noted that God has no plan B ... there is only plan A. In bad times, as in the fall of Jerusalem when this book was written, or in the period of Jewish exile in Babylon, when parts of Isaiah were written, we can look to the wonder and beauty that still remains in God's creation and know that the bad times will pass.

John spoke of the omniscience and timelessness of God, to whom past, present and future are one.

We spent some time with Isaiah, chapter 40:

1 "Comfort, yes, comfort My people!" Says your God.
2 "Speak comfort to Jerusalem, and cry out to her, That her warfare is ended, That her iniquity is pardoned; For she has received from the Lord's hand Double for all her sins." **3** The voice of one crying in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord; Make straight in the desert A highway for our God. **4** Every valley shall be exalted And every mountain and hill brought low; The crooked places shall be made straight And the rough places smooth; **5** The glory of the Lord shall be revealed, And all flesh shall see it together; For the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

[These excerpts are from the New King James version.]

... and also with the final chapters of Job, who has been arguing that God should face him to say what he had done to deserve his suffering; God replies in chapter 38:

1 Then the Lord answered Job out of the whirlwind, and said: **2** "Who is this who darkens counsel By words without knowledge? **3** Now prepare yourself like a man; I will question you, and you shall answer Me. **4** "Where were you when I laid the foundations of the earth? Tell Me, if you have understanding. **5** Who determined its measurements? Surely you know! Or who stretched the line upon it? **6** To what were its

foundations fastened? Or who laid its cornerstone,

We looked at the third chapter of the second letter of Peter, which is captioned "the day of the Lord" and reads like a precis of the Book of Revelation, and at verse 4 of Psalm 90:

For a thousand years in Your sight
Are like yesterday when it is past,
And like a watch in the night.

"Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

2 Corinthians 9:7

This year's Pledge Campaign has been successful. Our theme of "**transforming generosity**" has impacted our parish in a positive manner. Many parishioners give of

their time to help at Martha's Pantry, Community Breakfast, and Laundry Love. Also, during Advent, Grace members generously give to children whose parents are incarcerated by purchasing presents, so they too can experience the love of God. It is also evident that we as a church family are giving back to God what He has given to us.

In comparison from last year's pledge campaign, we have received similar amount of pledges totaling slightly less money but have received increased amount of new and/or recommitted pledges and fewer parishioners decreased their pledge. As of December 13th, 2018, we have received 131 pledges from parishioners totaling a pledge amount of \$202,801. As a comparison from last year as of November 29th, 2017, we had received 129 pledges totaling \$204,375. In addition, 18 new and/or re-committed pledges totaling \$16,556 were received during this year's pledge campaign compared to 14 pledges totaling \$13,800 in 2017. Finally, we have received only 6 decreases in pledges totaling the amount of \$1,756 as compared to 17 pledge decreases totaling \$10,380 in 2017. Overall, we as a church are moving in the right direction to have faith that God will provide and everything we have is because of God. By stepping out in faith to support our ministries through monetary ways, our church will continue to exist. However, if we want our church to expand and grow to spread the word of God and His grace and love, we should consider increasing our pledge and/or making

a pledge for 2019. We, the parishioners of Grace Church, are the backbone of this wonderful church family and without your monetary support, our ministries and Church may suffer.

For those who have made a written monetary commitment to Grace's ministries, thank you for your support. However, there are many parishioners who pledged last year and have not turned in their pledge card for various reasons. We are asking those who have not turned in their pledge card, please do so through mail, email at office@gracechurchnb.org, or phone call to the church office at 508-9930547 to communicate with Katie, administrative assistant, or placing your pledge card in the offering plate. If those who pledged for 2018 campaign but have not yet turned in their pledge card for 2019 campaign would pledge the same amount as last year, then the total pledge amount would be over the budgeted amount of \$225,000 for 2019 pledges. Just think, two years consecutively, we as a church family would support the church and our ministries through the current parishioners and not depend so heavily on the Endowment. We as a church are becoming more financially responsible for Grace Church to continue for many decades so our children, their children, and their children, etc. will have a church family like we do.

Thank you again to all who have stepped out in faith to be generous to Grace Episcopal Church's ministry in New Bedford and surrounding

communities. Together we will make a difference.



From the Treasurers

The Finance Committee recommended budget was passed by the Vestry at its November 28th

meeting. This budget was the result of input and conversations with the Trustees, the vestry, and of course the Finance Committee.

The vestry-passed Fiscally Responsible budget reflects a true draw of 4.5% from the Unrestricted account of the Endowment (e.g. bank fees are withdrawn prior to distribution, i.e. net of fees). In the past, fees were paid after distribution, resulting in the then 5% draw equaling an actual draw of almost 6%. 5% is not sustainable, so 6% is even worse. The percentage draw is now lowered and fees come out of the growth. A long term goal has been discussed of 3.5-4%. We are on the right track, but as the budget does not include a second clergy, much needs to be done to raise money for Pastoral Leadership, as a second clergy is needed to help fulfill our parish goal for Youth Ministry. A long-range plan calls for a target of \$300,000. This is going to take a team effort; a cadre of people is ready to work on this.

Our Outreach is legendary; we get much needed support from the Endowment, from grants and from gifts. In addition, we have Together Now monies for **new outreach initiatives**. If we want to expand outreach, more than we do now, we have seed money and monies in funds. We would be happy to discuss new initiatives with anyone wishing to take leadership.

Our Rodman House roofing project is complete and looks great. Plans for interior repairs caused by leaks are presently being discussed. But as our more than capable Junior Warden has pointed out, the other roofing project cannot be put off. With the age of our facilities, Grace does not have the luxury of saying that enough has been done on the facilities. All that was done was necessary, not cosmetic.

One goal that needs more attention is Incorporation. This does not need money, but needs real leadership to spearhead concrete, measurable initiatives with clear cut results.

With energy, cooperation, transparency and leadership, all of our long term parish goals are achievable. The treasurers are very grateful for all the support and hard work necessary to make these difficult choices. In the long run, Grace will be a stronger parish.
