What do these words mean?

We have no idea!



Think about this...

You write a song and share it with your best friend. A few months later you hear the song on the radio. Your best friend stole the song and said it was his. Now he is a millionaire and lives in a mansion.

How do you feel?



How do you feel?

Most likely you feel mad, upset, unhappy, cheated. That was YOUR song and someone stole it!



Your best friend took **credit** for your awesome song.



So what is copyright?

Copyright is a type of protection given to anyone who creates something. This includes writing, art and music.



So what is plagiarism?

Plagiarism is copying text, images video or anything else someone else has created without giving credit to that person.



Why is plagiarism wrong?

- ››› It is disrespectful to the person who created the work.
- ››› Plagiarism is stealing.
- ››› Plagiarism is cheating.
- ››› Plagiarism is illegal.



What does this have to do with me?

If your teacher asks you to write a report or complete a project, she wants the work done by you. She does not want you to copy words out of a book or copy and paste from a web site.



So what do I do?

- ››› Give credit to the person who created the work.
- ››› Summarize the words (put them into your own words.)
- ››› Keep track of your sources (places you found the information.)
- ››› You must give credit for any images or music you use as well.

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Works Cited

- » a list all of the sources that you used to find your information
- » listed in alphabetical order by the author's last name
- » includes books, magazines, web sites, images and online databases and encyclopedias

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Bibliography

- » a list all of the sources that you used to find your information
- » listed in alphabetical order by the author's last name
- » includes books, magazines, web sites, images and online databases and encyclopedias

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Source

- » every place you found your information from

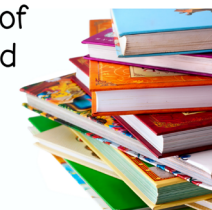


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Citation

- » information about your source
- » must be written a certain way

Note: different types of sources means you need different information



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Citation

» Examples

- title
- author
- publisher
- publication date
- date you looked at the site
- URL
- page numbers

Author.	"Article title."	Magazine name:	Magazine date,	Page numbers.

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Example citation Web Site

Author.	"Article name."	Title of website.	Date article was published.	Date you visited the site.	URL of the site.
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Dean, Alice. "15 Facts About Volcanoes." Science for Kids. June 2010. 25 Aug. 2016.
<http://www.volcanoes.sciencekids.com>.

Note: many times you will not find the author or the date of a web page. And that's all right. Just write as much information as you can.
