

The Underground Railroad

"Freedom is only for those bold enough to take it," said Harriet Tubman. While living as a

newly free woman in the North, she committed herself to learning everything she could about helping other slaves escape. A group of people spread across the North and South called Abolitionists created a network, or system, of ways to help more Blacks escape. This system was called The Underground Raircad.

It wasn't an actual rairoad with trans. It was a collection of people willing to hide runaway slaves in their homes and "conduct" them to the next safe location or "station." This system also included traveling on foot near rivers so that hunting dogs could not find the slaves. The Underground Rainoad actually got its name from a frustrated white slave owner who went searching for a runaway slave. After his search came up empty, he reportedly yelled out in exasperation, "He must have gone on some kind of underground road around here!"

As word spread of this so-called "underground road" Harriet and her new abolitionist friends wanted to take more action. Harriet eagerly signed up to be a new "conductor" and made over 19 trips throughout her life to help slaves escape. **"I never ran my train off track," she once proudly admitted to** biographer Sarah Bradford. **"I never lost a** single passenger!"


