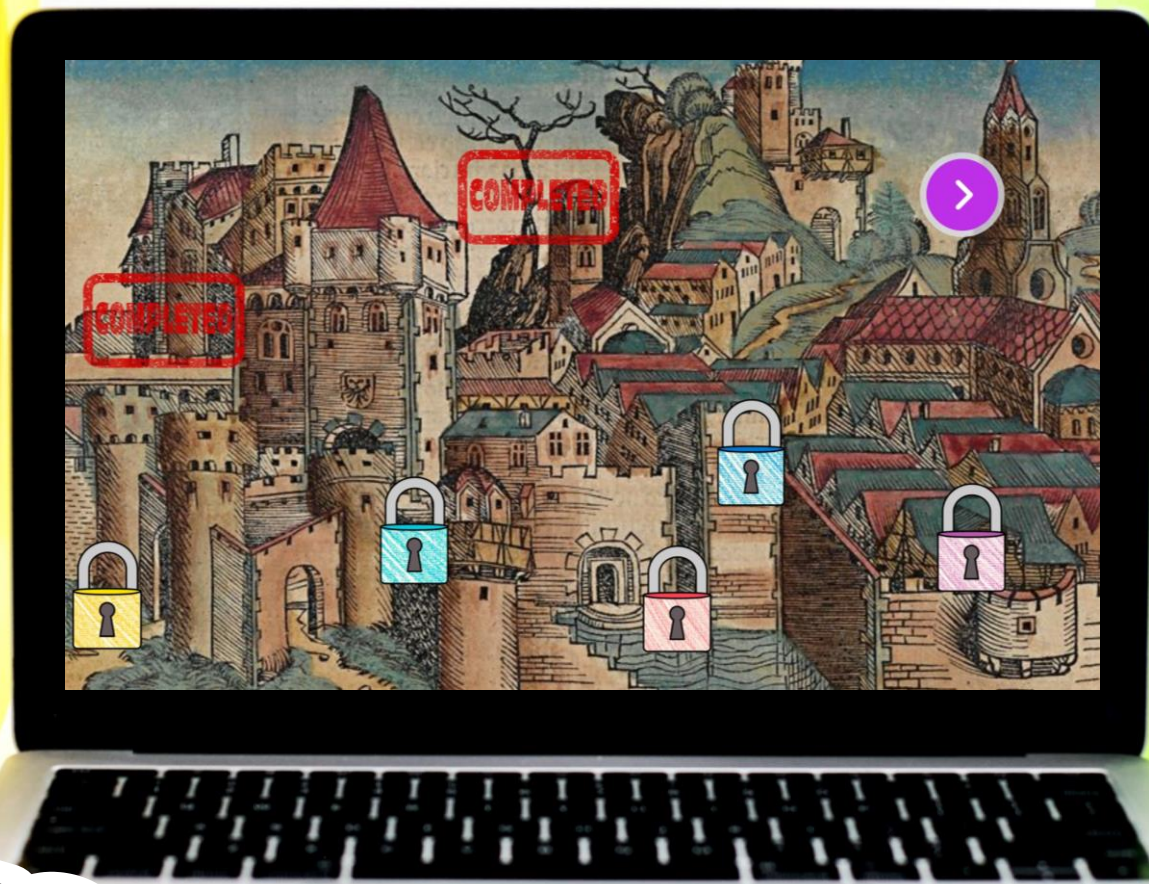

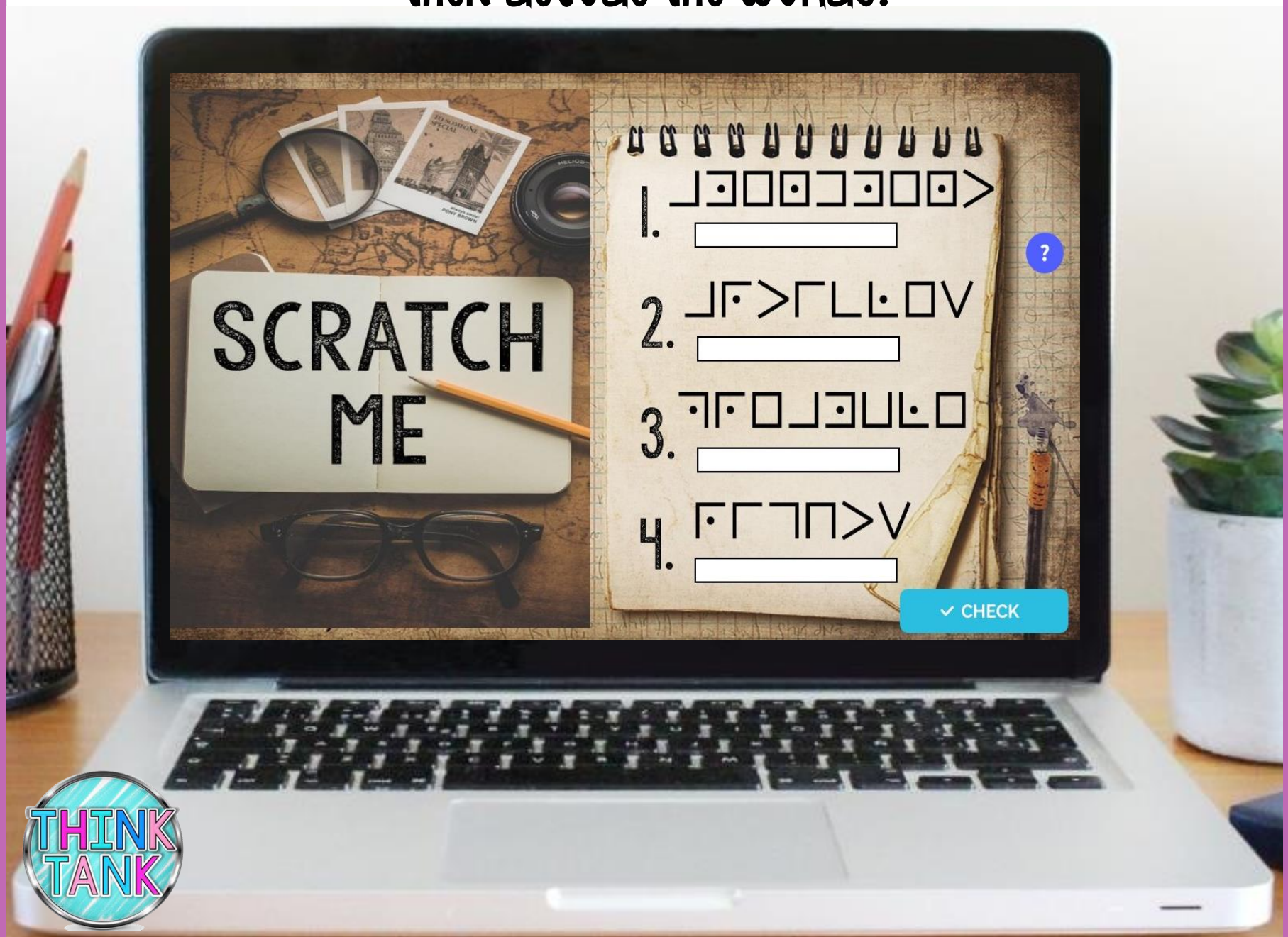




In Ancient Greece, two of the main city-states were Sparta and Athens. Athens was more of a center for learning and the arts, but Sparta was a warrior society. They took pride in military service above anything else. In fact, the very name Spartan means self-restrained and rule follower. Loyalty to the state came above any one person, even family and friends. Sparta prided itself on its warriors and believed they were descendants of the Greek god Hercules. In fact, military service began at the age of seven, when young boys began to train to become a Spartan warrior. They began a strict course of education on how to be good soldiers and how to interact with others in their capacity as soldiers for Sparta. This education was called Agoge and stressed the importance of obedience and duty to Sparta, discipline in their actions, and endurance.
