


#### Spies of the Civil War

The Civil War was a fight between the north and the south. Union soldiers of the north and Confederate soldiers of the south sometimes recruited spies. Each side hoped that they would gain advantages by knowing what the opposite team was planning. Spies sought information on troop movements, numbers of soldiers, and the army. This information was known as "intelligence." Generals used this intelligence to determine whether or not to attack. It also helped them decide where to strike. Sometimes it even led them to retreat or pull back.
