#### What Is a Diamante?

Diamante is pronounced like: DEE + UH + MON + TAY

It is a special poem that always has 7 lines and has the shape of a diamond when it is written.

Diamante poems do not have to rhyme. They can be about one topic, or they can describe two topics that are opposites 🛚 of each other.

#### Diamante Writing Helper Card

ADJECTIVE - a word that describes a noun

ex. The London Bridge is a huge, beautiful and long bridge in England.

The words huge, beautiful, and long are adjectives that tell you more about The London Bridge

NOUN — a person, place, thing or idea

ex. Jack kicked the ball around Wal-Mart. which made his Mom yell at him.


#### Diamante Writing Helper Card

> Examples: Bored, Boring Ran, Running Color, Coloring

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
