Vocal explorations help students warm up their singing voices and follow different melodic contours







Give students pipe cleaners

explorations

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
The Match It Game helps students learn to identify melodic contours

Guidelines break composing down into small, easy steps that students can follow

LET'S COMPOSE!

- 1. Think of and sing a pattern using Mi, So, & La
- 2. Your pattern should have four beats and begin with So.
- 3. Then, arrange your composing cards to match the pattern you sang.
 - 4. Share your pattern with the teacher.



Differentiate your lesson by asking students to compose using four or eight beats


Students drag and drop pitches to create compositions in Google Slides™




Have students write their compositions down on their worksheets to be displayed


